Rev. T. Melville Bailey: Founder of the HMHS

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Mel Bailey: minister, historian, mentor, father, husband, uncle and friend. Add to that the founder of several heritage groups including Head-of-the-Lake the Historical Society, the MacNab Circle and the Hamilton Mountain Heritage Society. Wow! Can one person be all this? Well that was and is my Dad. He would have celebrated his 100th birthday on November 17, 2012.

Mel was born in Hamilton to Mary and Charles Bailey. He and his twin sister, Margaret, were the youngest several books on Hamilton and of nine children. He grew up across Dundurn Castle.

from Dundurn Castle where he often played as a child, always wondering about who lived in that castle.

An athlete, he competed in track and field events at the first British Empire Games, held in Hamilton. Mel worked for the CPR for 15 vears before getting the Lord's call to serve. In 1949 he was admitted to Knox College at the University of Toronto, often hitch-hiking to get there as he didn't own a car. He was ordained in 1952, following in the footsteps of his three uncles who were also Presbyterian ministers. He became the first minister of South Gate Presbyterian Church in 1954, and served there until his retirement in 1980.

Tragically Mel and his wife, Jean, lost their two sons in a boating accident while vacationing up north. Jean died a few years later of cancer. Mel remarried and he and his wife Janet had a daughter. He was also father to a son.

Mel was admitted to the Hamilton Gallery of Distinction in 1994. Mel passed away on January 29th, 2005, his daughter's birthday, at the age of 92.

In 2009 the Hamilton Historical Board established the Rev. T. Melville Bailey Heritage Award. Years have gone by and still

Tea with Mrs. Voelker

In mid-December four members of the Hamilton Mountain Heritage Society were privileged to take tea with Mrs. Viva Voelker and her family. Her three daughters and a grandson welcomed us into the heritage home in Waterloo. The Voelker house was one of the first buildings in Waterloo to receive heritage designation, in 1977. Dubbed 'The Christmas House' by one of the grandchildren, there are similarities in photos of Auchmar at Christmas and the Voelker House at that time of year.

Mrs. Voelker is the widow of Dr. Phillip Voelker, who was the physician posted at Auchmar when it was used as an RCAF Convalescent Hospital during WWII. Her daughter, Linda, was baptized at Auchmar, while Mary Lou loved to spend time with the horses when she visited. All the children remember shouting out on family film nights "Hamilton hospital, Daddy!"

When doing research for Mountain Memories, specifically looking for photos of Auchmar, Doug Embleton came across copies of The Tonic, the in-house newsletter of the hospital. In it he found photos with names. In what he thought would be a fruitless effort he found the name Voelker in the phonebook and gave a call. He was informed that Dr. Voelker had passed away but his family still resided there and would be happy to help him out. Doug and his wife Amy made the trip to Waterloo and while visiting and getting photos were told that coloured films from 1943 also existed. They were stashed away but arrangements were made to collect them at a later date. Stuart Leslie was then called and together the two men brought their find to the executive of the HMHS. Stuart found somebody who could save the film and convert the images to a more modern format. Music and commentary were added and the video Auchmar: The War Story resulted. Mrs Voelker was in attendance at the meeting where the video was premiered.

For Remembrance Day 2010, the Spectator ran a story about Auchmar and the RCAF that mentioned the video was now available as a DVD. The family became aware of that article this past fall and the requests for the DVD came flooding into the HMHS. Maggie Voelker, who now lives with her mother, told that 'Mom hasn't been able to watch the video since a granddaughter bought her a new TV that will only accept DVDs'.

Mrs. Voelker, who will be 98 this spring, enjoys afternoon tea with some of her homemade cookies each day.

We are looking forward to a return visit to the Voelker House in the spring to see the gardens, (over 1000 daffodil and narcissus bulbs were planted this fall) and flower boxes with copper liners that Dr. Voelker made while stationed at Auchmar. The repainting of the exterior of the 1849 (yes, it's older than Auchmar!) home should also be completed.
