We are very happy to announce that we have a new publication titled *It Happened on the Mountain*.



On May 10, 1927, at Brown's Hall on Concession Street, the Mount Hamilton Improvement Association held a meeting of persons interested in gardening. This resulted in the formation of the Horticultural Society of Hamilton Heights.

Now known as the Mount Hamilton Horticultural Society, over the years the members have held flower shows and sales, awarded prizes and worked to beautify parks and public spaces on the Mountain.

The group chose the clematis vine as their symbol because it grows well in lime-rich soil, ideal for conditions found on the Mountain.



Meetings are held at Chedoke Presbyterian Church, 865 Mohawk Road West, Hamilton, at 7:30 p.m. on the third Friday of each month except May, Jul, Aug & Dec.

Auchmar Updates

- The National Trust for Canada held their annual conference in Hamilton this past October with over 500 delegates attending. As part of the programme, a bus tour of heritage sites on the Mountain was conducted by Diane Dent and Carolyn Samko including a tour of Auchmar.
- As part of Canada's 150th birthday celebrations, the City of Hamilton will receive an infrastructure grant of \$273,000 to cover one third of the cost of restoration work on the Auchmar House garden walls.
- The Friends of Auchmar will be presenting "Stories of Auchmar" at their spring meeting in late April. The date and location will be announced closer to the date.

This picture shows modern metal retaining walls installed along the new **Claremont Mountain Access Road**.
