January was recognized for serving as HMHS Recording Secretary and providing the theme-inspired refreshments for our meetings. Susanne was recognized for serving the past five as HMHS Membership Secretary. The T. Melville Bailey Award for Lifetime Achievement was awarded to Pat Saunders who has been volunteering for an amazing seventy years. Pat is a long time resident of the Mountain and a former President of the Hamilton Mountain Heritage Society. She has been involved with numerous heritage groups including the Hamilton Historical Board, Hamilton Psychiatric Hospital Museum, Friends of Auchmar, Save Century Manor, Hamilton-Wentworth Heritage Association, and the Women's Canadian Club.

The winner of the Susan Bennetto Student History Award was Paige Milner of Westmount Secondary on the Mountain.





## **Test your "Mountain Memories"**

A Farewell Service was held on Sunday March 3, 2019 at **Holy Trinity Anglican Church** which was an important presence on the Mountain for over 140 years. The first building, pictured below, was begun in 1877 under the leadership of the first rector Canon George Armstrong Bull, namesake of Bull's Lane. The church was located on the southeast corner of the Caledonia Road (now Upper James) and the line between the fourth and fifth concessions of Barton Township. The concession line was later named after the fifth Rector of Holy Trinity whose name was?
