Nora Henderson to be Honoured on George Hamilton Day 2014



In 2009 Hamilton City Council declared that the August Civic holiday would thereafter be known as George Hamilton Day in honour of the founder of the City of Hamilton.

The Hamilton Historical Board was given the responsibility of planning how the day would be celebrated. From the beginning an interesting dimension was added wherein each year in addition to George Hamilton deserving Hamiltonian another would be recognized as the Greatest Hamiltonian of the year. A poster displaying the nominees from the five surrounding historical societies was created and put on display in the City's Museums and at the Farmer's Market. Ballots were provided and the nominee receiving

the most votes would be honoured as the Greatest Hamiltonian on George Hamilton Day.

George Hamilton Day celebrations consist of speeches, entertainment and refreshments and are held in the community of the honouree. Thus the event was held in Ancaster in 2012 when Clementina Fessenden was the honouree and Stoney Creek in 2013 when Sarah Calder was honoured.

This year the event will be held in the hospital formerly known as 'The Henderson'. It will take place on Monday, August 4, 2014 from 11 a.m. until 1 p.m. Along with entertainment and refreshments the Henderson plaque, a project of the Hamilton Mountain Heritage Society, will be unveiled to the public. All Hamiltonians are welcome to attend.

The five deserving Hamiltonians who have been honoured to date are: George Hamilton, Thomas B. McQuesten, Clementina Fessenden, Sarah Calder and Nora Frances Henderson.

The Story of the Pillars

The Mountain Sanatorium was established on the mountain brow in 1906 under the direction of Dr. A.D. Unsworth. It occupied 98 acres of orchard land on William Macklem's farm at the edge of Ancaster Township. The following year, the Hamilton to Brantford Radial Electric Railway was opened. It ran directly below the hospital grounds. The ravine cut through the centre of the Macklem property where Sanatorium Road abuts the edge of the escarpment on the east side of the Holbrook Building. Family and friends visited patients being treated for tuberculosis at the San by taking the radial train from Hamilton or Brantford and ascending the stairs in the ravine. It was a very busy place, being the largest sanatorium in the British Empire with a bed capacity of 750. The stairs were in use as late as 1931 when the radial line closed down. (Mountain Memories, page 5).

Traces of these concrete steps and abutments at the top of the ravine and of concrete columns which supported the stairs can still be seen. The condition of the abutments was brought to the attention of the HMHS by a concerned resident of the west mountain, who noticed them while cycling. He has contacted the City several times over the past year.


A member of the HMHS Executive immediately visited the site and took photos. These photos have been shared with a colleague who studied Heritage Masonry at Algonquin College. His opinion, having seen only the photos, is that the stone wall does seem to be in good condition as do the stairs with the concrete newel posts and hand rail. The rubble stone and mortar pillar needs serious repair. He felt that the areas in need of repair are repairable. He then outlined some issues to be addressed: ownership, permissions, permits and, of course, cost.
