# A Recognition of the Service of Private Jacob Hess

Jacob Hess, a member of one of the first families to settle on Hamilton Mountain, was honoured as a Veteran of the War of 1812 at a ceremony held on Sunday, October 6<sup>th</sup> at The Anglican Church of the Resurrection on Mohawk Road West. A memorial stone with plaques was unveiled at the rear of the church property beside a path leading to the small pioneer cemetery where Jacob and his parents Michael and Charity are buried. The Hess family, along with the Rymal, Smith and Kribs families were Loyalists from Pennsylvania who had migrated to Upper Canada in 1788, settling on land grants on the Mountain.

During the War of 1812, Jacob Hess served as a Private in the 5th Regiment Lincoln Militia along with his brothers Samuel and Peter, and a son-in-law David Almas, Sr.

The Anglican Diocese became responsible for the care of the cemetery when they purchased the property in 1959 to build a church, now named Church of the Resurrection.

The cemetery had become known as the Hess Cemetery due to the prominence of the three Hess gravestones. Sadly, in 1996 the stones were vandalized and smashed into pieces. The fragments have since been stored inside the church where they were reassembled and displayed after the ceremony.






### **Canadian Reformed Theological Seminary 1969-2019**

The Canadian Reformed Theological Seminary celebrated its Golden Anniversary at an Open House on September 7, 2019. Established by the federation of Canadian Reformed Churches, the CRTS teaches courses leading to degrees and diplomas in Theology and Divinity. The Seminary began in 1969 in a large home on Queen St. S. before moving to the Mountain in 1984. It is located on West 27<sup>th</sup> St. in the former Chedoke Presbyterian Church building built in 1961. A library addition was completed in 2000.
