Twentieth Anniversary of the Hamilton Mountain Heritage Society


At the society's meeting on September 15th 2016, HMHS Historian Murray Aikman presented an illustrated talk on the history and accomplishments of the Hamilton Mountain Heritage Society.

It was 20 years earlier on September 14th 1996 that a group of long-time Hamilton Mountain residents were invited to meet at the home of Rev. Mel and Janet Bailey to discuss forming an organized group to research and preserve the heritage of the Mountain. The first public meeting took place November 28th 1996 at The South Gate Church with a presentation on Mountain schools. Over the past two decades our many accomplishments include producing heritage publications, presenting speakers on Mountain topics at our meetings, writing articles for the Mountain News, organizing June Outings, and

participating in public outreach events like
Concession Street Fest, Heritage Day, and
Canada Day at Mountain Drive Park. We have
campaigned for the retention of the Henderson
Hospital name, authored and funded historical
plaques at Mountain sites, supported the
Friends of Auchmar, advocated for Chedoke
House and Century Manor and placed our
portrait of Isaac Buchanan on loan at Buchanan
Park School.

We also collect material related to Mountain history in our Archives and our newsletter, website and Facebook page help preserve and spread Mountain history far and wide.








Hamilton Mountain Heritage Society Publications



Hamilton Sesquicentennial 1846-1996

In 1996, the year of the Hamilton Mountain Heritage Society's founding, the City of Hamilton celebrated its 150th birthday. A feature event was the Sesqui Super Home on Paradise Lottery.

Tickets were sold at \$19.96 each for a grand prize package worth over \$800,000 including a "Super Home with the infrastructure of the 21st century," a boat, a motorhome, and a 1952 Studebaker. More than 60,000 people reportedly toured the home at 1996 Upper Paradise and over 72,000 tickets were sold. The winners were Hamilton Mountain barber Sam Licata and his wife Frances.


