# The HMHS Celebrates its 15<sup>th</sup> Anniversary

On September 14, 1996 a group of 20 Hamilton Mountain residents met at the home of Janet and Mel Bailey to share their mutual interest in the heritage of Hamilton Mountain and consider working on individual projects of Among those present interest. were: Murray Aikman, Doug Embleton, Stewart Leslie, Jessie Plater, Jackie Carson, James McKeen, Jim Elliott. Keith Anderson, James Gordon, Colwyn Beynon and Janet and Mel Bailey.

A steering committee was formed and when next they met on November 28, the Society was organized. At this first general meeting, held Southgate at Church, Jackie Carson was the Jackie served speaker. as secretary for eight years. The first executive met in February of 1997: in March the name of the

society was chosen and a membership fee was set. The first on-site talk was held at Auchmar. Sandra Beveridge joined the group and had name tags and a newsletter ready for the meeting in September 1997.

The executive formed in 1998 stayed in place until 2005. Application was made for a charitable number; the first June outing, organized by Margaret Firth, was to Cottonwood Manor and Mel suggested the Society put a book together. June 1999 was first time the Society the participated in Concession Street Fest. In 2000 Doug Embleton presented three 8 mm films and from these came the video 'Auchmar: the War Story'. That year also saw the launch of Mountain Memories at the Hill Park Seniors Centre.

In November of 2001 the meetings moved to Olivet United Church, members were nominated for Heritage Awards and planning began for a plaque for Century Manor. In early 2002 the Society decided to support the publication of the Chedoke book and a plaque which was unveiled in 2006.

To celebrate Mel's 90th birthday a joint meeting with the Head-of-the-Lake Society was held at Erskine Church in November 2002. In 2003 he was made the Honourary President of the Society. Bob Williamson was successful in having photos placed in the Mountain News under the heading "Then and Now" and Mel and Stewart Leslie organized papers on the Rymals. In 2005 Mel Bailey passed away and the Society petitioned to have Arcade Park renamed in his honour. The book "Our World's a Stage" was published and the Society launched its website.

The past 5 years have been equally active with June outings, support of the Rise and Fall of Memorial School DVD and a reprint of Mountain Memories. The executive anticipates continued activity and success for one of Hamilton's youngest heritage organizations.

### Do you remember?

A school located on the south-east corner of Upper Wellington and Mohawk Road? Built in 1927 the school was originally Union School Section No. 3, as it served Ancaster, Barton and Glanford Townships. In 1952 it was transferred to the Board of Education for the City of Hamilton when the area south of Mohawk Road was annexed into the city. Administratively it was under the responsibility of the principal of the new (1954) Norwood Park School and was renamed "Twin School". When the new Ridgemount School was built 50 years ago this year, the students were transferred to that building. The old structure was torn down to be replaced by a supermarket. Unfortunately there don't seem to be any photos of the school. Do you remember the school? Do you have any photos?
